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## **Tips on how to avoid errors**

practising colleagues on their experiences.

Of course the list will not be exhaustive, but the tips can help practice teams to think over their work processes and discover sources of errors.

They may not be evidence-based or have been tested in trials, but the tips have proved themselves in the practices of those who made the comments and that is why they have recommended them.

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## **STERN-Leading article on high blood pressure in cooperation with the Institute**

With the cooperation of our Institute, the STERN quality weekly maga-



zine wrote its leading article on high blood pressure (Nr. 9 of 22.02.2007).

The article contains a mixture of critical and informative factual information, along with illustrative case descriptions. In particular, it focuses on the consequences of arterial hypertension and possible therapies, as well as the problems Germany has with the provision of adequate medical care. ## 2nd part of DEGAM chronic heart failure guideline – long version



The DEGAM guideline on chronic heart failure is of very high quality and fulfils all practical needs, was the view of

the GPs who reviewed it for its suitability for use in practice, before going to print. But they also said the long version is too long, and the wealth of information cannot be easily handled. So we decided to split the long version.

The first, practice oriented, part already appeared in autumn of last year. Now preparations for the second part of the long version have been completed, it is ready for print, and the publisher has announced that it will appear this month. This volume includes a summary of all the evidence evaluation which went into the guideline's recommendations. The results of systematic reviews, health technology assessments and primary studies were cross-referenced and discussed.

The guideline was developed as part of a project sponsored by the German Ministry for Education and Research and developed independently of industry. Thanks to its methodological quality and the balanced participation of interest groups, the DEGAM guideline was recently judged "exemplary" by the German Agency for Quality in Medicine (AeZQ).

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## Launch of the anonymous error circle!

[www.fehlerzirkel.de](http://www.fehlerzirkel.de) has now been activated and can be used by the general practices that have registered, of which there are 57 to date. The error circle is a virtual quality circle and, for the time being, is exclusively available for general practices that have completed the European Practice Assessment (EPA).

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## Over 1,000 students trained in evidence based medicine

Since the 2003/2004 winter term, the seminar "evidence-based medicine" has been obligatory for clinical students of medicine. As part of the so-called Section 1 syllabus (epidemiology, medical biometry and medical computing), the basic principles of systematic literature search and the evaluation of diagnostic- and intervention studies, as well as guideline basics, are taught.

Students are required to prepare a term paper which includes individual

case examples which they have to solve independently and then present as part of a *journal club* on the final day.

With the 52nd of these seminars, the number of trained students crossed the 1,000 mark. No other university can boast similar numbers for a seminar explicitly dedicated to EbM. Further information and details on how to register for the courses can be found (in German) under:
